Fall is upon us as we prepare to celebrate our Reunion on October 25th and 26th and November 1st and 2nd. As membership is our lifeblood, remember that active members provide for the successful future of our Valley. Therefore, it is through the reunion that we bring in the renewal of our own commitment as new brethren join us for this auspicious occasion.



October is when we also celebrate the Feast of Tishri with its ten toasts to the health of our members and our Valley. Yet the celebration of Tishri has a much deeper significance:

Tishri is the celebration of the deliverance of the Children of Israel from Egypt and the reaching the Promised Land. As they were led through the wilderness, God decreed the celebration of a seven-day feast in the Jewish month of Ethanim, during which they were to live in "sukkahs" (shelters or Booths) – He decreed that this feast be celebrated annually to forever remind the Israelites that He had rescued them from Egypt. After the return from the period of Babylonian captivity the month became known by their name of "Tishri". This "Feast of Tishri" (or "Feast of Succoth") is thus a symbol of freedom. Some 450 years after its origin, the Feast of Tishri was utilized in dedicating the newly completed King Solomon's Temple, and this association led to its adoption by Scottish Rite Masonry to symbolize our dedication to brotherly love and human accord in a peaceful world.

This adaptation is evoked in lessons taught by the Third Degree lecture in the Blue Lodge, wherein we learn that David, King of Israel, was denied the privilege of building the Temple of God "due to his reign being one of many wars and much bloodshed". His son, Solomon, ascended the throne and, after David's death, brought peace and tranquility in the world through his wisdom and righteousness – God thus chose him to perform "so great and glorious an undertaking" as that denied David. And so it was therefore

through Solomon, that construction of the Temple was guided by the hand of God. Association of the Feast of Tishri with the dedication of the Temple of Solomon led to its third name – the "Feast of the Tabernacle". The Feast of Tishri thus epitomizes the character, principles and purposes of Scottish Rite Masonry, all being consistent with the dictates of God.

The feast has been adopted by the Scottish Rite to remind us of the righteousness of God as exercised through the wisdom of Solomon as we are reminded of in our Masonic ritual. The toasts remind us of who we are as Masons and how God guides each of us in our lives. Let us celebrate in October, both through the Feast of Tishri and our Fall Reunion.

Prior to this most recent honor and position, he was serving as both the Lieutenant Grand Commander of the Supreme Council and as the Sovereign Grand Inspector General in Virginia.
